ORANGE PARK TEAM PLACES AT 2013 LINEMAN COMPETITION...

Clay Electric had three teams and one apprentice competing at the 2013 Florida Lineman Competition on April 20 in Jacksonville.

Despite the cold, rainy weather, the teams did an excellent job, according to General Manager Ricky Davis. The Orange Park team consisting

of Jared Baldree, Cody McLendon and Dustin Shepherd took second place in the vertical hurtman rescue and third place in the crossarm change out. There were 23 teams representing 11 different utilities at the event. While this was the 13th annual Florida Lineman Competition, this was only the second year Clay Electric has participated. The competition involves five timed events which simulate normal work procedures. Competitors are judged on the application of safe work practices, proficiency of their work, and speed.

PROJECT SHARE HAS HELPED MORE THAN 3,200 FAMILIES...

The co-op's Project Share program continues to receive considerable support, thanks to the generosity of Clay Electric members. Since the program's inception in July 1997, Project Share has helped 3,216 members (through first quarter 2013) with a total of \$464,866 in disbursements. Just this year, the program has assisted 15 member families. Project Share has enabled members to help other members pay their electric bills during a period of financial difficulty. Clay Electric collects the Project Share donations made by members and the Salvation Army distributes the funds based on their financial criteria. By designating a tax-deductible amount to be added to the electric bill each month - or by sending a one-time donation - members can help others keep their lights on when times are tough. 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
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The General Manager's Report

Over the years, our commitment to our members has remained strong

In March we held our 75th Annual Meeting, and we appreciate all our members who attended.

We're very proud of the fact that we've been serving members for 75 years. Clay Electric was created in the 1930s to meet the challenge of bringing electricity to rural areas. Over the past decades, Clay Electric's board of trustees, management and employees have met many challenges with the same determination our founders had when they went about the task of signing up folks to join the fledgling cooperative.

While many things have changed in the way we serve our members, our mission remains the same as it was in the early years – to bring you the best service at competitive rates.

Legislative Session

During each annual Legislative session, we closely follow any proposed bills that could help or hurt the cooperative or its members. This year, the electric co-ops of Florida, along with the Florida Electric Cooperatives Association, supported an electricity theft bill that increased the penalties for stealing electricity.

Currently, the criminal penalty is a first-degree misdemeanor, regardless of the dollar value of the electricity stolen.

The new law allows penalties that vary depending upon the value of the electricity stolen.

Additionally, the law will increase the minimum award in a civil action against the thief from \$1,000 to \$3,000, mitigating the utility's time and cost of recovering its losses. The bill was signed by the governor in April and will take effect on Oct. 1.

Co-op Owners for Political Action

Speaking of the legislature and politics, last year we began offering our members the opportunity to join a political action committee known as Co-op Owners for Political Action (COPA).

Groups of citizens learned years ago that their collective voices were often heard by lawmakers above the voice of single citizens. Political action committees were formed to provide groups of like-minded citizens with the ability to raise funds and help elect lawmakers who were willing to listen to their concerns.

By joining COPA, you become part of a strong grassroots network of citizens concerned about the long-term success of the electric cooperative program. Maintaining our presence in the political process is critical to the future of the electric cooperative program and the communities it serves in these unpredictable times.

A regular annual membership in COPA is only \$25. The cost of memberships can be broken down into small monthly payments and added to your electric bill statements. I encourage you to consider joining us in our efforts to stay involved in the political process.

Our rates

As I have written about previously, our rates continue to be among the lowest in the state.

Our residential rate for 1,000 kilowatt hours is \$109. This is lower than all other cooperatives in the state and is the 7th lowest among all utilities in the state. In fact, our rates are lower than all of our neighboring utilities. We are proud to have this competitive rate position.

Storm season

Hurricane season begins next month, and forecasters are calling for an active season. Be assured we are ready should a major storm cause widespread outages in our service area.

I have encouraged my department directors to conduct an outage simulation with line supervisors and foremen to make sure we are as prepared as possible to meet the challenge of an outage.

Our simulation begins with a transmission line problem which impacts many feeders and transformers. The simulated outage situation would include making sure all accompanying documentation would be filled out correctly and then checked for accuracy.

I think this is an important test, especially for newer employees who were not here when the last major storms caused widespread, sustained outages.

Thank you

I began my career here nearly 40 years ago, and obviously I've seen many changes.

This year, I am reminded of a slogan we have displayed in our front lobby, which reads "Proud of the past, Prepared for the future." To me, this is truly what the co-op stands for: a strong history of providing service and a vision for tomorrow.

We are proud of how much we have accomplished through the years on your behalf, and we pledge to continue our tradition of providing excellent service and affordable power.

As always, we appreciate the opportunity to serve you.

Co-op's 75-year history marked by growth, ever-changing industry

In the late 1930s, nine out of 10 rural homes still were without power. Private, investor-owned power companies served most of the cities and were not eager to extend their lines to reach rural homes, farms and businesses.

Clay Electric's story began when Ed Wiggins purchased the Keystone Heights power plant in 1925. After extending lines to the small communities near town, the small 115-kilowatt generating station could not keep up with Keystone's growth.

Wiggins needed money for expansion but decided he was not willing to sell the business to an investor-owned utility. He sought funding from the newly-formed Rural Electrification Administration. Wiggins worked to sign up prospective members and had maps drawn up.

Leadership and industry changes

Clay Electric has had five general managers: Pat Loudon (1940-63), E.T. Martin (1963-83), Tommy Millican (1984-88), Bill Phillips (1989-2009) and Ricky Davis (2009-present). A total of 41 different members have served on the board of trustees.

Since the early days, Clay Electric has purchased power from other utilities to supplement its limited generation capabilities. In 1968, the co-op ceased all large-scale generation in favor of purchasing all its electricity needs. Today the

power comes from Seminole Electric.

Growth

The co-op has experienced steady growth over most of its history. In 1939, the co-op served 343 members in five counties. In 1951, that number had grown to more than 8,000 customers.

In 1962, the co-op had nearly 20,000 accounts, and by 1975 another 32,000 were added to make a total of 52,837.

Fast forward to 1990 and the co-op reached 100,000. Today the co-op serves a little more than 165,000 accounts.

Toward technology and efficiency

In the early decades, members were encouraged to purchase new-fangled electric appliances that would improve their lives with comfort and convenience. By the 1970s, the focus shifted to encourage conservation and later it moved to efficiency. Clay Electric instituted a load management program in the late 1970s and early '80s.

This program, which allowed the co-op to turn off water heaters and HVAC systems in members' homes to better manage the demand for energy at peak times, was eliminated in 2000.

Now, the co-op encourages the wise use of energy through an emphasis on efficiency with the Energy Smart Rebate Program, as well as educating customers about the best way to save energy and money.

While Clay Electric is no longer a small, rural electric utility, its mission in 2013 is fundamentally unchanged: to exceed the expectations of our members by providing excellent customer service and reliable electric service at competitive rates.

Member recalls husband's battle for Clay Electric service

Gladys Copeland remembers when her husband fought for Clay Electric.

She said it was in the 1940s and one of the investor-owned utilities wanted to come into the Archer area. But her late husband Henry Copeland didn't want to be served by them.

Mrs. Copeland said he insisted it would be better to have the co-op as their utility. Problem was, the co-op wasn't prepared to expand that far at the time. She recalls Henry hired an attorney and filed a lawsuit in order to have Clay serve their area. At the time, Clay's price for electricity was less than the for profit utility. But that wasn't Henry's only motivation for wanting Clay over the other utility. She recalls that Henry felt being served by a local co-op was preferably over having electricity provided by a company that wasn't local.

"I was really proud of him," Gladys recalls of the time. "It brings back a lot of memories."

The couples' first home didn't have electricity, but their store did. She remembers that Clay's lines stopped at another family's property line on the Gainesville side of Archer.

After settling the matter legally, Gladys said Clay Electric agreed to provide the poles, wire and electricity into the rural area, but the co-op would not make the installation. The co-op dropped off the poles one day and Henry and some local men proceeded to set them. Soon after, Clay Electric was providing the electricity to the area.

Gladys has lived in Archer for almost 69 years. Her current home's account was activated almost 50 years ago. To this day

she is glad her late husband fought to have Clay Electric serve their area.

She said service has improved and outages have become fewer over the decades.

So, what's her favorite part of being a member of the cooperative? Capital credits, she said, without hesitation.

In addition to this benefit, Gladys said she has always felt that Clay Electric was a good, caring company that takes care of the customer.

Take control of your summer power usage by following these tips...

Summer is a fun time of year, but it also means hot, humid days, afternoon thunderstorms, plenty of pesky mosquitoes...and higher electricity bills.

You can't control the heat, storms or humidity, but you do have some control over your summer-time electricity usage.

It's a fact that as the outdoors warms up, your home experiences more heat gain. In response, you adjust the thermostat to remain comfortable.

Utilities often suggest a thermostat setting of 78 degrees. Why 78? An inactive person begins to perspire when the temperature rises above 78. But what happens if you're active and get too warm? You lower the thermostat. However, for every degree the thermostat is set below 78, the run time of your air conditioning unit or heat pump increases 5 to 8 percent. This ups your electricity usage.

Here's a few suggestions to help you lower your electrical usage during the cooling season:

- Have your air conditioning system serviced annually.
- The ductwork should be inspected to make sure there are no duct leaks. If leaks are found, have them sealed with approved aluminum

tape or mastic. Duct tape isn't a fix-all for air conditioning ductwork.

- Keep all windows and doors closed when the air conditioner is in operation.
- Change the filter(s) monthly or whenever they show signs of dust accumulation. Higher quality air filters trap more dust particles, and they need changing as often as lesser quality filters.
- Keep air supply registers open to all rooms, even those not frequently occupied. Closing off air supply registers increases the air pressure on the duct system, and this ups the chances of duct leakage.
- Keep all interior doors to rooms with supply air registers open, unless a return air vent is located within the room. If you keep doors to rooms without return air vents closed, it does not allow for adequate air circulation and the temperature of the room will increase. Sound familiar?

You can't control the summer storms or the outside humidity, but you can get a handle on your energy usage and lower your monthly bills. As for those pesky mosquitoes, try insect repellent!
