Much to be grateful for, including you

As the page begins to turn on 2024, my heart is filled with pride after witnessing the display of tenacity demonstrated by Clay Electric's employees — and I hope your hearts are full as well — following what proved to be an eventful storm season that dealt Florida a three-fer of hurricanes, but also a year marked by great accomplishments and success.

We received countless, likely hundreds, of well-wishes and thank-yous before, during and after the storms from you, our members. If you haven't heard me say it before, I'll happily repeat it again and again: Clay Electric members are truly the best. There's no time like the present to remind each of you how grateful I am for your membership and, of course, the privilege of leading this elite team.

We remain focused on enhancing reliability across the co-op's service area, and we highlighted a few of those efforts this year, including a voltage conversion project in the Salt Springs community. Large-scale projects like these take weeks even months to plan, followed by days of work on the ground — in this case, approximately 60 of our employees — all accomplished to lower our members' chances of experiencing an outage. Cutovers double the output from distribution lines, and they're more efficient. That in turn means a reduction in power costs, and as a co-op, that savings is passed to our members.



Looking ahead, we're transitioning away from wood crossarms in favor of fiberglass. Why? Drastically lower maintenance numbers and fewer power outages, combined with explosive rising costs in lumber. It makes this decision an easy one, and in typical co-op fashion, everyone reaps the benefits.

In case you missed our announcement over the summer, we're proud to be partnering with the University of Florida on its first-ever "smart garden," and we're looking forward to seeing the results of these agricultural pods that are designed to grow vegetables hydroponically. So much of the community we serve is based on agriculture and forestry, and we're excited by this opportunity that sheds light on a new way for farmers to potentially grow crops.

Youth Tour winner addresses Board, hosts hygiene drive

Cayden Parker, one of our recipients of the Youth Tour to Washington trip this past summer, will next year travel to Atlanta, Georgia for the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association's (NRECA) Annual Meeting, where he'll serve as Florida's representative of the organization's Youth Leadership Council (YLC).

Before then, the student of Santa Fe High School in Alachua County visited Clay Electric headquarters and delivered a speech focused on the importance of the power industry to the co-op's Board of Trustees — the same speech that helped him secure a trip to the nation's capital and his position as YLC representative. He'll recite it again during his trip to Georgia.

"We're happy for you. We're glad you received the award," said Board President Kelley Smith. "We look forward to seeing you in Atlanta."

During the meeting, Parker revealed he's received college acceptance letters

from Penn State and the University of Central Florida. He's considering studying biomedical engineering or neuroscience, something he's become very passionate about.

Over the holidays, Parker successfully put together a toiletry drive that benefits homeless shelters and foster homes in the Alachua County area. He chose that as his community project, a requirement for being on the YLC. He had school resources and friends who all came together to make the drive successful. It wasn't an easy task as back-to-back hurricanes (Helene and Milton) delayed things, and it was his first time orchestrating such an event.

"Seeing the smiles, like, wow, this is a lot of stuff, you know, knowing that it was such a big impact on that community, it really made everything worth it," Parker said.

The high school senior was accompanied to the co-op by his grandfather, the Rev. George Trotman, who proudly watched and

recorded with his phone as his grandson delivered his speech to the Board. It was immediately clear his grandfather is one of his biggest inspirations, but also one of Parker's greatest advocates.

"For him to be so adamant about me, so passionate about my future, my career and just to see how proud he is, how encouraged he is, like, whenever he has a chance to come with me on one of these opportunities, just to see his dedication, it just makes me want to be even more determined," he said.

Youth Tour, Parker said, will be a core memory, not just because of the places he visited, but the connections and new friends he met along the way, many of whom share similar passions.

"It's just a new side of life. Not one that many people living in rural communities get to experience, so, it's just an opportunity to expose yourself to something new, something different," he said. "It's an awesome opportunity."

Not one, not two, but three — three times this year, Florida bore the brunt of a hurricane, and each of them impacted Clay Electric members.

In August, the deluge from Hurricane Debby brought intense rainfall that made power restoration especially difficult. In late September, Hurricane Helene's winds destroyed hundreds of our utility poles and transformers, leading to a weeklong restoration effort. While Hurricane Milton in October largely spared our service area, perhaps its most deplorable trait was punctuality, making landfall just a week after our crews finished restoring power in wake of Helene.

Frankly, the term storm-weary just doesn't quite cut it for a state that had enough of what unfortunately was predicted to be an active season for tropical weather. You can hope for the best — and we certainly did. But the forecasters saw this one coming.

Hurricane Helene

We spoke about Debby in the last issue of the Kilowatt, which left approximately 50,000 members in the dark after making landfall along the Big Bend as a Category 1 storm. Approximately 100 poles across the service region needed replacing after that storm, which left much of our northern areas with intense flooding.

By comparison, Helene was worse. Much worse. Approximately 470 transformers were replaced, as were about 630 utility

poles — more than six times the number in Debby. Member outages due to the storm doubled to about 105,000.

Vonda and her husband are members. They have a home in Three Rivers Estates, one of the areas hardest hit by Helene, and she finally got her power back after a week. But all things considered, that was among the least of her worries as the storm, which made landfall along the panhandle as a Category 4, rolled through.

She wasn't at the house, but her husband was, and he made a split-second decision to get out.

"The winds were getting too rough and he knew the trees were going to give way, he just didn't know which ones," Vonda said. "Thank God he left."

Where her husband would have been in bed is the exact spot where a limb came crashing through the roof.

"He wouldn't be here," she said. "And

it came through the living room, so he would've been on the couch. So, either way."

Holding her grandchild close, Vonda recalled two other times she's been impacted by hurricanes, including Hurricane Michael in 2018, which flooded their property in Panama City, and Hurricane Irma in 2016 at the family's property along Black Creek in Middleburg, which Vonda said was about 10 feet above the 100-year floodplain. Never had the house been flooded before the storm.

"When I left there that night, water was over my kitchen countertops," she said.

After Helene, the family's home in Three Rivers Estates needed a lot of work. Vonda said she's grateful things weren't worse, and that, fortunately, the home was spared when just a week later Milton came ashore.

"We're very fortunate for the linemen

from Clay Electric and everyone else who came and helped you," Vonda said.

A total of 750 combined workers including Clay Electric lineworkers, vegetation management and mutual aid crews both within and out of the state helped to restore power to members.

A one-two punch

We had just finished turning all our members' lights back on when eyes turned to Milton. Of the three storms to hit Florida this year, Milton had the smallest impact on Clay Electric's service area, where members experienced about 35,000 outages at the height of the storm.

But millions of other Floridians were left in the dark, and parts of the southeast had to deal with tornadoes, 46 in total, according to the National Weather Service. Three of them were EF-3 tornadoes, including one that traveled 21 miles and reached winds of 155 mph. Data from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration, commonly known as NOAA, found it's one of the more prolific tornado-producing storms on record in modern times.

The October storm made landfall just south of Tampa as a Category-3 storm. For our area, it was a major rainmaker, causing intense flooding for many members, especially to the south.

Fortunately, the co-op reached essentially restored status (greater than 98 percent with power) by noontime on our second full day of restoration. By day three, everyone had their power back, including members on Drayton and Hogg islands, which were washed out by floodwaters.

- 3 8-ounce packages of cream
- 2/3 cup of sugar • 2 tablespoons of cornstarch
- 1/4 cup mashed bananas
- 1/2 cup of heavy cream
- 2 teaspoons of vanilla
- 1/4 teaspoon of Baileys Irish
- 1/4 teaspoon of RumChata

1. To make the crust, place vanilla wafers in a blender; pulse until finely crushed. Add margarine; process with pulses until combined. Press mixture onto the bottom of a 10-inch springform pan; refrigerate.

- 3. To make the filling, beat the cream cheese in a large bowl with an electric mixer at medium speed until creamy. Add sugar and cornstarch; beat until blended. Add the eggs, one at a time, and continue beating. Mix in the bananas, heavy cream, vanilla, Baileys Irish Cream and RumChata until
- 4. Pour the cream cheese mixture into the chilled crust.
- 5. Place the pan on a cookie sheet and bake for 15 minutes. Reduce oven temperature to 200°F and continue baking for 1 hour and 15 minutes or until
- 6. Loosen the edges of the cheesecake; let cool completely on a wire rack before removing the rim of the pan. Refrigerate, uncovered, for 6 hours. Allow the cheesecake to stand at room temperature for 15 minutes before serving.
- 7. Start mixing on a low speed to incorporate the powdered sugar into the whipping cream, vanilla and RumChata. Then gradually increase the speed to high as the mixture starts to form soft peaks. You may need to pause, scrape down the sides, and continue whipping. Beat the whipping cream on high speed until stiff peaks form.
- 8. Top the cheesecake with the whipped cream and sliced bananas.
