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Clay Electric members enjoy unique benefits

Members can now vote for trustees online

The ever-increasing speed at which technology changes has been at the forefront of our lives for some time now.

We have definitely felt those changes here at the co-op. Technology has allowed us to provide you, our members, with faster and improved service and many new tools at your fingertips in recent years.

This month, we are delighted to announce that you can now use one of those tools to cast your ballot for the board of trustees election. Simply login to your My-ClayElectric account and click on the Vote Now button. You may either use the app or login on your desktop computer.

Besides recent advances in technology, when members are asked what they like about Clay Electric, things like excellent service, competitive rates and reliable power are often mentioned.

Read on for more details about what makes us more than just your electric utility.

Elected trustees

Elected trustees are one of the main characteristics that sets electric cooperatives apart from other types of utilities. Our board of trustees consists of members who have been nominated by fellow members residing in their districts and are then voted upon by the membership at large.

Several of our board members have many years of service on our board, plus many have served on the Florida statewide association board. Others have served at the national level.

Your co-op has a nine-member board of trustees. The duties of the board of trustees include meeting monthly. They review a variety of issues which have an impact on the co-op, including financial and operational reports. The board establishes overall policies and also declares Capital Credits.

We've been fortunate to have a board that is dedicated to the co-op and has provided excellent leadership. Its support of management and employees has been extraordinary, and this support has contributed to the success of Clay Electric.

Capital Credits

Many of our members tell us they really like the fact that we're a not-for-profit utility and have refunded Capital Credits to our members for 48 consecutive years. At some utilities, any money left over at the end of the year goes into the city general fund, to be spent on road paving or some other project. At Clay, these funds are set aside and later refunded to the members. Members tell us they look forward to their Capital Credits being posted on their March bills as a credit, which helps lower their power bills for that month. Entitled members who have moved away from our service area receive a refund check. Last year, the board of trustees declared a \$12 million refund.

Operation Round Up

As a cooperative, we are in a unique position to go beyond providing electricity. Several years ago, we began Operation Round Up, which is another way for us to do just that. If you look inside this issue of the Kilowatt, you'll see the latest recipients of the Operation Round Up funds. These organizations were selected by the Clay Electric Foundation board, and each month more funds are awarded to charitable organizations and groups working to improve the lives of people in our service territory.

In closing, I would like to mention that Clay Electric has had mission and vision statements guiding us for many years. A few years ago, we added a purpose statement that speaks directly to our heritage as a cooperative. We exist "to enrich the lives of our members by delivering electricity and strengthening the communities we serve."

Candidates nominated for board of trustees

Members can now vote online for the board of trustees. Simply login to your MyClayElectric account to cast your vote for the candidates.

Members who vote will be entered into a drawing to win one of 43 bill credits. Please see details on the bottom of

Members gathered at four trustee district meetings in January to select candidates for the Board of Trustees in Districts 1, 2, 4, and 6.

Cindy Loose was nominated as the candidate for the District 1 seat. Kelley Smith (District 2), Carl Malphurs (District 4), and Jimmy Wilson (District 6) are all incumbents and were nominated without any qualified opposition.

Each year, positions on the co-op's nine-member Board of Trustees are up for election. Members within the districts select one or two members to be candidates, and then the entire membership votes. Members must vote either by online voting or by absentee ballot. There is no in-person voting.

Election results will be announced on ClayElectric.com March 17 and at the Annual Meeting gathering of the members on Saturday, March 25.

Meet the candidates

Cindy Loose of Keystone Heights is a candidate for District 1. Loose has taught mathematics at Keystone Heights

Jr./Sr. High School for the last 26 years. She graduated with a master's degree from the University of Florida. Cindy has served as Mathematics Department Chairperson, Math Honor Society Sponsor, member of the National Honor

She also participated in the rigorous program of becoming a Nationally Board-Certified Teacher. Currently, along with teaching mathematics at KHHS, Cindy is also spearheading the inaugural year of the Cambridge AICE/ Pre-AICE program, serving as the Cambridge AICE Coordinator.

Kelley Smith of Palatka has served as

the District 2 trustee since 1987. Smith has held all of the board officer positions on the co-op's board of trustees: president, vice president, secretary

and treasurer. Smith holds the National Rural Electric




Cooperative Association's Director Gold credential certification, the highest level of achievement in NRECA's Director Certificate Programs.

Rather vote by mail?


To request an absentee ballot, you will need to provide your account number associated with your membership. Request one by visiting https://Ballot. ClayElectric.com (no www) or calling 1-800-224-4917 toll-free.

The last day to request a ballot is March 8 at 3 p.m. Ballots must be received by 4 p.m. March 13 via U.S. mail in the return envelope provided for the ballots to count.

Trip of a lifetime brings power to remote village

Lights and instant electricity are something Americans take for granted. Electricity has been a part of daily life here for more than 8 decades – but that isn't the case everywhere.

Three Clay Electric lineworkers had the unique opportunity to travel to Central America to be part of a group bringing electricity to people for the first time.



A team of volunteer linemen from five Florida electric cooperatives took their tools and skills to Guatemala late last year, to install power lines and connect electricity to more than 20 homes in a remote village. The project was organized by NRECA International and funded through donations. This is the first time Florida co-ops have taken part in a project.

Matt Hickey, Dave Poncher and Damian Stewart represented Clay Electric on the trip. None of them had ever done anything like this before.

The team left on Nov. 30 and stayed in Guatemala about 17 days to install power poles and lines without the help of bucket trucks or other heavy machinery, due to rough terrain. They were also working without the convenience and

efficiency of modern tools.

Hickey said he volunteered because he saw the opportunity as way to highlight the career of lineworkers while using his skills to help others. Poncher agreed, adding that this was a once in a lifetime opportunity to do linework in another country and to help people who truly are in need. Stewart said he saw the trip as a chance to make a difference in the quality of life for others.

The top challenges the men listed for the project included the lack of some equipment and machinery, patchy communication and the mountainous terrain.

All of the poles were already set when the team arrived, but the anchors weren't set and the poles were not pre-drilled. The lineworkers had to climb the poles, drill holes and then install the hardware. When doing a similar job back home, the holes would be drilled and all of the hardware would have been set before the pole was set. This saves time and allows the crew to get to the next step faster. Another setback occurred when two poles had to be moved due to an issue with where the line would be run to the village.

While the workers lacked some specific tools (like well-equipped bucket trucks), they also dealt with just not having enough of certain pieces of equipment. While this slowed progress, it also meant having to make do with what was available – and sometimes just doing things the old-school way.

Hickey noted that communication between the teams of workers was made difficult by the fact that phones did not work. He would have to walk or drive between poles to relay messages. Poncher said the terrain also made work difficult. Setting poles in the mountains meant that every pole was an angle pole, which required more anchors.

While the work days were long, the lineworkers found the project rewarding. Poncher liked getting to know the local people as well as fellow lineworkers from other Florida co-ops. Hickey appreciated the opportunity to be able to do linework in a place with a completely different landscape and terrain. He said the people are different.

"They were so thankful and they were willing to do anything to help us. The whole experience was cool," he said.

Stewart said his favorite part of the experience was turning the lights on for the people. He noted that it is difficult to explain the feeling of being there and seeing firsthand what it meant to them.

"Being able to do what co-ops started out doing," he said. "Doing it all by hand, including wiring the houses and turning the lights on and then checking every house was just incredible. You could tell you changed their life."

Hickey and Poncher echoed that sentiment, adding that there is additional satisfaction that comes from building brand-new service to a location that has never had power before.
All three lineworkers have been part of storm restoration work where they are called out to work in less than desirable circumstances to rebuild electric systems damaged by storms. But this project was

very different from that type of work.

Poncher said the people impacted will remember this forever. Hickey said the people were so thankful and grateful.

The workers truly got to know many of the people because they spent time in each home wiring it with a breaker box, three outlets and two switches for four lights. One of the outlets was dedicated for a refrigerator.

In addition to the team of lineworkers from Florida, the local municipal electric company workers helped on the project, as did a member from each household that was going to be receiving electric service. These workers also made an impression with their dedication and positive attitudes.

Clay's lineworkers appreciated the opportunity to use their skills to help others. They said the experience in Guatemala is one they will never forget, and they would be willing to volunteer for another project in the future.

ReNew Recovery Cafe - \$15,000 (Volusia County)

ReNew Recovery Café in Daytona Beach offers free, low-barrier, trauma-informed community-based services to diverse populations on the path to recovery. Funds for the grant will be applied to the renovation of the center's kitchen to help prepare meals for members.

Seamark Ranch - \$15,000 (Clay County)

Seamark Ranch, Inc. (a nonprofit corporation) was organized in Northeast Florida in 2001 to provide a solid Christian home for abused, neglected, abandoned, orphaned, and homeless children in need of a chance. The Ranch is dedicated to an environment filled with grace, love and service which fosters emotional healing in reclaiming the lives of such children. The Ranch's major source of revenue is private contributions. Funds will cover a portion of the children's mental health program.

Concerned Citizens of Bradford County, Inc. - \$1,000 (Bradford County)

Concerned Citizens of Bradford County, Inc. is an outreach organization dedicated to the needy, deprived, seniors, and especially to the proper rearing of children to become model citizens. The group specializes in educating, teaching character, building confidence and modeling positive behavior through its afterschool club, summer day camp, senior club and youth sports. The money will be used to provide personnel for the 6-week summer day camp program.

Frank DeLuca YMCA Family Center - \$2,500

(Marion County)

The purpose of the Frank DeLuca YMCA is to improve lives of all in Central Florida by connecting individuals, families and communities with opportunities based on Christian values that strengthen spirit, mind, and body. Funds from the grant will support the YMCA Scholarship Fund, which provides financial assistance

for those who cannot afford memberships and programs.

ISKCON of Gainesville - \$13,920 (Alachua County)

ISKCON of Gainesville, commonly known as Krishna House, administers food programs that fight food insecurity in the community. Grant funds will help increase the number of meals that can be served each week.

Stirrups 'n Strides Therapeutic Riding Center - \$3,000 (Marion County)

Stirrups 'n Strides' mission is to provide therapeutic horseback riding and carriage driving to anyone with physical, mental or emotional challenges, and to improve the quality of life for these individuals with the opportunity for emotional, educational and physical growth through horsemanship and competition. Funds will be applied to scholarships for riders.

Catholic Charities Bureau, Inc. - \$10,000 (Putnam County)

Catholic Charities is a nonprofit organization that provides services to the most vulnerable in our community, advocating for justice, human dignity and quality of life. Funds from the grant will support the Emergency Assistance Program, which provides financial assistance to clients for essential utilities, housing, transportation or medication.

Green Tomatoes Parmesan

Ingredients

3 med green tomatoes, sliced 1/4-inch thick

¼ c cornmeal

1/4 c grated Parmesan cheese 2 T all-purpose flour

34 tsp garlic salt

½ tsp dried oregano 1/8 tsp pepper

1 egg, beaten

¼ c vegetable oil

Instructions

Lightly sprinkle tomatoes with salt; drain on paper

towels for 30-60 minutes.

Meanwhile, combine cornmeal, Parmesan, flour, garlic salt, oregano and pepper in a shallow plate. Dip each tomato slice into egg, then into cornmeal mixture.

In a medium skillet, heat oil over medium-high. Fry tomatoes, a few at a time, for 2 minutes per side or until golden brown. Drain on a paper towel-lined wire rack.

Serve immediately. Yield: 4-6 servings.
