'A powder keg': Dry conditions fuel spring wildfires

Dry conditions, burn bans and recent fires in and around parts of Clay Electric's service area this spring have been a reminder of how quickly things can change when the woods and brush dry out.

In Florida, dry weather, brush and wooded areas can quickly create the conditions for a fast-moving fire. This spring's prolonged dry stretch has only raised the stakes. News4JAX Chief Meteorologist Richard Nunn said brittle ground cover, freeze damage and strong winds have combined to create "a powder keg" during what he described as the worst dry stretch since the late 1800s.

"Days of prolonged wind with gusts near tropical-storm strength create the perfect recipe for rapidly spreading wildfires," Nunn said.

May is Wildfire Awareness Month, and at Clay Electric, wildfire prevention is part of the work that happens year-round. Crews maintain rights of way, inspect lines and equipment, and ad-

dress concerns before they turn into something bigger. One of the most important parts of that effort is vegetation management, especially during dry stretches, when brush, limbs and power lines can become a more dangerous mix.

Clay has also added drones to help monitor lines and identify potential concerns more quickly and safely. Tools like that support the co-op's ongoing efforts to spot issues early and reduce risk across the system.

Wildfire prevention does not stop with the co-op. Members can help reduce risk around their homes and property by clearing dry leaves and brush, using extra caution with outdoor equipment and avoiding burning during dry or windy conditions. Local burn restrictions can change as weather conditions change, so it is important to follow official guidance in your area.

If you ever see a downed power line, stay well away and call 911. To report an outage, use the **MyClayElectric** app.

Crews inspecting poles to improve reliability, keep costs in check

strengthening reliability and making sure outside companies — not members — pay their fair share for using co-op infrastructure.

The audit, conducted by Alpine Communications, will cover about 242,000 poles across the co-op's six districts over roughly eight months. Crews will move from pole to pole documenting equipment attached by cable and telecommunications providers and gathering updated information about each pole.

Members may see contractor crews inspecting utility poles across Clay Electric's service area in the coming months as part of a systemwide audit aimed at

The work helps protect system reliability. When equipment is attached to a pole without proper review, it can add weight and stress. Engineers use the audit information to evaluate those attachments and make sure poles are not overloaded and can withstand the kind of high winds seen during major storms and hurricanes.

The project will also help ensure companies using co-op poles are following industry standards and being billed accurately. Under updated agreements, each individual attachment is counted separately, creating a more accurate accounting of pole use and helping hold all companies to the same standard.

Alpine crews will not perform electrical work or interrupt service. Their role is limited to observing, documenting and photographing poles and attached equipment. Workers will be clearly identified with Alpine gear, ID badges and vehicles marked as co-op contractors. Kelley Smith, whose career has spanned public service and state government, has served on the co-op's Board of Trustees since 1987. He is now retiring after one of the longest tenures in Clay Electric's history.

Smith represented District 2 for nearly four decades, bringing decades of public service experience to the role and serving in each of the Board's officer positions during his tenure. Over the years, he was part of decisions that guided the co-op through periods of growth, change and increasing demand across its service territory.

A Palatka resident, Smith has served in local, regional and state leadership roles, including time in the Florida House of Representatives. His background in land management has closely mirrored the rural communities the co-op serves, giving him a perspective shaped by both the land and the people who depend on it.

"Kelley brought a level of experience and perspective that's

hard to replace," said GM/CEO Andy Chaff. "He understood this co-op, the communities we serve, and the decisions that come with it — and that made a difference over the years."

Smith said his approach to Board service remained consistent throughout his tenure, rooted in the responsibility to represent members and keep their interests at the forefront.

"I always tried to keep the members in the back of my mind — how would this affect them?" he said.

That mindset, he said, is part of what kept him committed to the role for nearly four decades. Along the way, he saw the co-op evolve from a system built largely on manual processes and fieldwork into one shaped by advancing technology and growing expectations.

"It's a labor of love. Once you understand what a cooperative represents, it becomes something that's very rewarding to be part of."

While much has changed over the years, Smith said one thing has

remained consistent.

"The culture has always been to provide the best service you can at the most reasonable price," he said.

As he steps away, Smith said the decision comes with mixed emotions. His mantra going forward is "grandkids, traveling and fishing."

"It's been an incredible journey, and I've enjoyed it so much," he said. "It's been hard for me to let go, but I know the time has come."

While a lot can change over time, one thing that never will is Clay Electric Cooperative's commitment to you — providing safe, reliable and affordable electricity.

Looking back on the past year, I'm proud of the progress we made together — and just as importantly, how we managed it responsibly.

First, we stayed focused on reliability. Our crews and employees put in countless hours strengthening a system that now spans more than 14,000 miles across 15 counties. That's a big responsibility, and while much of the work happens behind the scenes, it's what helps keep the lights

on during storms and supports the steady growth we're seeing across our area. These investments aren't just about today — they help us avoid bigger costs and disruptions down the road.

Second, we're working smarter. We've been testing new tools and approaches, like ductile iron poles with longer lifespans and drones that help us inspect lines and respond faster after storms. We also upgraded our Advanced Metering Infrastructure (AMI), giving us real-time data that helps us pinpoint outages, manage voltage and plan more efficiently. Simply put, better information helps us make better decisions, which saves time and money.

Third, we've remained disciplined when it comes to your co-op's finances. Costs across the electrical industry continue to rise, and while some of that is outside our control, we're always looking for ways to

operate efficiently and keep rates as low as possible. We've also maintained strong financial reserves and a solid balance sheet, ensuring we're well-positioned to invest in the system while keeping your cooperative on firm financial footing.

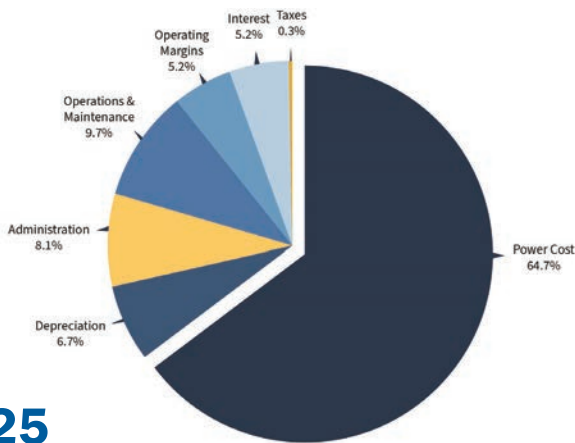
That approach is reflected in the Board's decision to approve a \$12 million Capital Credits refund in 2026. Returning those margins back to you is one of the things that makes the cooperative model different and something we're proud to do.

But what really sets this co-op apart is its people. From community involvement to programs like Operation Round Up, our employees as well as you, our members, continue to show what it means to be neighbors helping neighbors.

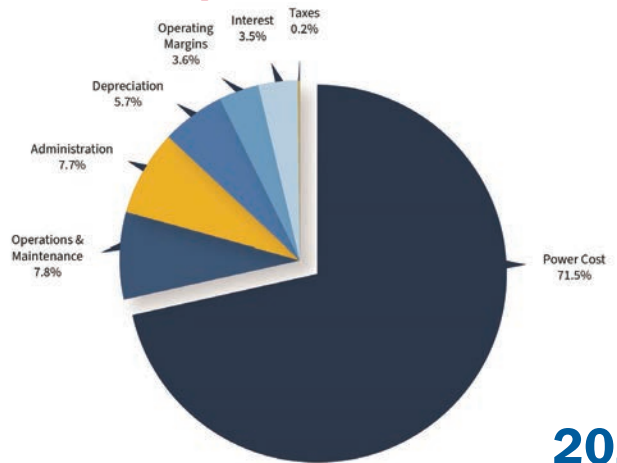

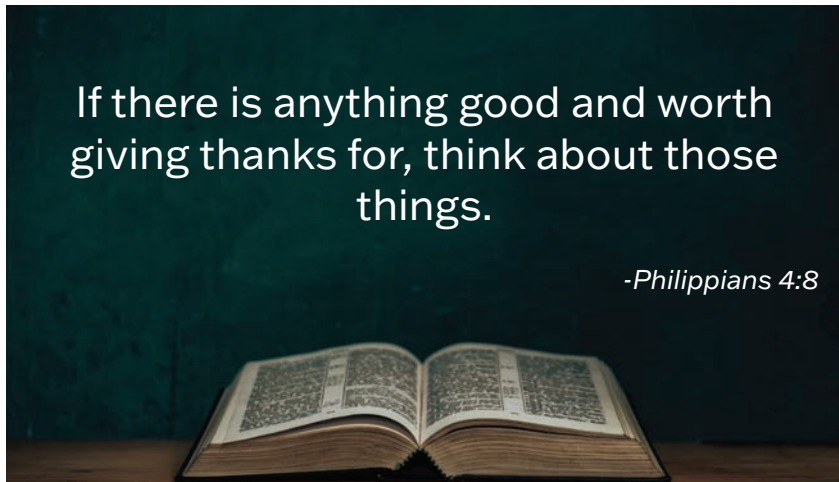

- 1 tbsp brown sugar
- 1 tsp smoked paprika

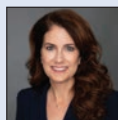

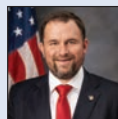
